The Barcelona pavilion by Mies van der Rohe is one of my favourite contemporary timeless buildings; as it holds its presence through its quality, clarity, balance and ultimately

> beauty. Here, space flows between the inside and outside, planes and elements intersect and define space seamlessly, materials are used clearly and beyond being a "finish", they become part of the architecture.

What is interesting is that this pavilion was not built to last but it has made such an impact on the design and architectural world that it was rebuilt about 50 years after it was demolished to



**TO ME, TIMELESS DESIGNS** are those that transcend culture, that hold their presence through their depth of quality, clarity, balance and ultimately beauty that doesn't shout for attention, that holds its impact across time and generations.

It is also typically well-executed, made with solid and "honest" materials that integrate well with the context in which they are located — they embody the genius loci or the spirit of a place. While a building has to work within its context, I don't think it has to be traditional or predictable, contemporary architecture can talk with the local history and culture without mimicking it.

Each era should be able to express this in its own way, directly addressing the expectation and the necessity of the users, a building address timelessness once it moves beyond architectural history and is able to express cultural character without copying the past but by reinterpreting it.

It used to be that buildings were built to last, to create a legacy — unfortunately this is very rare now, as buildings are typically developed as an investment, and as such, the quality of material and design is measured mostly against its commercial value. Also compared to the past, cities and the use of buildings now change much faster and this is obviously a problem if one brings this is the equation of making a building timeless.
